





BACKGROUND

The Capitola Art & Cultural Commission is an advisory body whose responsibility is to advise the City Council as to the allocation of public art funds and encouragement of existing and new programs in the arts for the enjoyment of the residents.

The Art & Cultural Commission participates in annual goal setting from which programs in the arts are planned for production in the budget year with City Council approval. The 2024/25 budget has planned twelve (12) Twilight Concerts, four (4) Art at the Beach, two (2) Movies at the Beach and Plein Air. Staff provide program reports on activity when relevant.

The Commission forms Committees for the support of City programs and, shall report to the Commission no less than quarterly under the Bylaws. Committees shall consist of no fewer than two (2) and no more than three (3) commissioners. If a vacancy occurs, the commission can choose to appoint a commissioner to the vacancy. The committees are as follows:

- 1) Twilight Concerts: Vice Chair Johnson, Commissioner Lengre, Commissioner Sylvan and Public Member James Wallace, sit on the committee.
- 2) Plein Air: Pending
- 3) Volunteer Recruitment: Chair Cahalen, Council Member Clarke sit on the committee.

DISCUSSION

Regular reports from staff and committees are provided to enhance communication and planning as well as keeping the entire commission up to date on the progress made by staff or committees. Program Reports are intended to only report out on progress. Any action requiring the entire commission to make a decision will be added to a future agenda under General Business.

SUBJECT: National Endowment for the Arts FY26 Grants

Recommended Action:

Provide feedback to staff on the proposed application for the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) FY26 Grants for Arts Projects (GAP) program. Staff is seeking input on a refined project scope focusing on the mosaic installation at the Rispin Mansion Fountain.

BACKGROUND

In a previous grant cycle, staff submitted an application for the Arts in California Parks Grant Program to support multiple public art enhancements at the Park at Rispin Mansion. That application proposed a range of artistic interventions, including sculptures, murals, and mosaics, to highlight the site's historical and cultural significance.

For the current funding opportunity under the NEA's FY26 Grants for Arts Projects (GAP) program, staff proposes refining the scope of the prior grant application to focus specifically on the mosaic enhancement of the historic fountain at Rispin Mansion. The NEA's Visual Arts grants require a 1:1 funding match, and staff has identified this project as a strong candidate given its alignment with the program's objectives and existing funding considerations.

DISCUSSION

The proposed Rispin Mansion Fountain Mosaic Project seeks to transform the existing 800-squarefoot historic fountain into a vibrant, artist-designed mosaic, celebrating Capitola's heritage and natural environment. This scaled-down project will allow the City to pursue a high-impact, community-driven public art installation while meeting the grant's financial matching requirements.

Proposed Project Scope:

- 1. Mosaic Artwork: A professionally designed and installed mosaic surface for the fountain reflecting themes of Capitola's cultural and natural history.
- 2. Community Engagement: Public workshops to incorporate community input into the mosaic's design.
- 3. Historic Preservation: Art elements will be designed to complement the fountain's original structure while enhancing its aesthetic and interpretive value.
- 4. Accessibility Considerations: The project will incorporate ADA-compliant features, ensuring accessibility for all visitors.

Proposed Grant Costs:

- Mosaic Design & Installation: \$50,000 from grant
- Community Workshops & Outreach: \$11,000
- Project Management: \$10,000
- Grant Administration: \$9,000
- Interpretive Signage & Accessibility Features: \$5,000
- Other Public Works Construction Staff & Materials: \$15,000

Total Proposed Project Budget: \$100,000 (NEA Match Requirement: \$50,000 City Contribution)

Staff is requesting feedback from the Commission on the proposed project scope, community engagement strategies, and overall feasibility.

FISCAL IMPACT This project will require a 1:1 funding match, with \$50,000 proposed from City in kind staff time and resources. The project as proposed will not impact the Public Art Fund directly.

The NEA GAP grant allows for a request of up to \$100,000; however, any match beyond \$50,000 would need to come from other sources. The Commission may consider expanding the project scope if it wishes to allocate additional funds from the Public Art Fund for complementary artistic features.

The Public Art Fund has a current balance of \$95,850 and an estimated \$50,000 committed to current projects.

PROJECT SYNOPSIS

To support the Rispin Mansion Fountain Mosaic Project, which will transform the existing 800 SF concrete fountain with a vibrant, artist-designed mosaic reflecting Capitola's history, nature, and community.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Project Description: Rispin Mansion Fountain Mosaic Project

The Rispin Mansion Fountain Mosaic Project will transform the existing 800-square-foot historic concrete fountain into a stunning public artwork that celebrates Capitola's cultural heritage, natural beauty, and community identity. This project will replace the fountain's aged surface with a vibrant artist-designed mosaic, creating an interactive and visually engaging space that integrates art and nature.

Through a community-driven artist selection process, this initiative will ensure that the final design reflects the voices and visions of Capitola residents, fostering a sense of ownership and pride in public art. The Capitola Art and Cultural Commission will oversee the selection of a qualified artist or artist team to design and implement the mosaic, incorporating historical themes, regional landscapes, and environmental motifs inspired by Soquel Creek and the surrounding ecosystem.

Project Activities & Timeline

Phase 1: Artist Selection & Design Development (Months 1-5)

- Issue a Call for Artists, encouraging submissions from local and regional artists with experience in large-scale mosaic installations.
- A selection committee, including members of the Capitola Art and Cultural Commission, city staff, and community representatives, will evaluate proposals based on artistic excellence, feasibility, and relevance to Capitola's history and landscape.
- The selected artist(s) will engage with community members through a public workshop to gather input and refine the mosaic concept.

Phase 2: Community Engagement & Final Design Approval (Months 6-9)

• The artist(s) will present preliminary designs in a public meeting, incorporating feedback from residents and local stakeholders.

• The final design will be reviewed and approved by the City of Capitola and Art and Cultural Commission.

Phase 3: Fabrication & Installation (Months 10-16)

- **Surface preparation**: The fountain's existing concrete structure will be cleaned, leveled, and waterproofed.
- **Mosaic fabrication**: The artist will work in stages, creating detailed mosaic panels offsite or in a collaborative setting where the public can observe the process.
- **Installation**: The completed mosaic panels will be securely adhered to the fountain structure, followed by grouting and sealing for long-term durability.
- The city will coordinate with contractors for site logistics, ensuring minimal disruption to the park.

Phase 4: Public Dedication & Education (Month 17-18)

- A community unveiling event will celebrate the project's completion, featuring discussions with the artist and interactive educational activities about public art and mosaic craftsmanship.
- The city will install interpretive signage detailing the artwork's themes, artist biography, and the significance of the Rispin Mansion and Soquel Creek to Capitola's history.

Artistic Excellence & Community Impact

The Rispin Mansion Fountain Mosaic Project will elevate the park experience by blending historical storytelling with contemporary public art. The project's themes will draw from:

- The rich history of the Rispin Mansion as a landmark in Capitola.
- The ecological significance of Soquel Creek, incorporating imagery of native plants, wildlife, and water elements.
- The community's connection to the site, honoring Capitola's cultural evolution and its diverse residents.

This project will be publicly accessible year-round, welcoming visitors of all ages and backgrounds to experience the transformative power of art in outdoor spaces. By prioritizing local artist engagement, the project will contribute to Capitola's creative economy, providing direct compensation to artists and skilled craftspeople involved in fabrication and installation.

This project is designed to be achievable within the available funding, ensuring high artistic quality while maintaining fiscal responsibility. The budget includes:

- \$50,000 in grant funding for artist fees, materials, fabrication, and installation.
- \$30,000 in city staff time for project oversight, logistics, and park maintenance coordination.
- \$20,000 in Local match contributions for additional material costs, community engagement activities, and interpretive signage.

The City of Capitola has extensive experience managing public art projects and will oversee all logistical and permitting requirements, ensuring timely project completion within a 9-month performance period.

Conclusion: Why This Project Matters

The Rispin Mansion Fountain Mosaic Project will revitalize a historic public space, transforming it into a work of art that connects Capitola's past and present. By engaging the community in the creative process, this initiative will foster a deeper appreciation for public art, cultural storytelling, and environmental stewardship. <u>Tile Mosaic</u>


Description: The bottom of the reflecting pool will feature a tile mosaic depicting elements of the natural environment.

- New vine species compatible with native oaks will be selected. Sundial:
 - Existing sundial base will remain in its present location. Pedestal will be rebuilt according to archive photographs. New, contemporary sundial/compass will be chosen, no archive photos are available that show the sundial piece.
- Overlook:
- Existing overlook columns and base wall to remain. All caps and balustrades to be rebuilt according to archive photographs and existing artifacts on-site.
- New benches in same location as historical shown in archive photographs, architectural details not discernable in photos. New benches will be simple without ornamentation.

- 12" high concrete wall along old walkway at northwest corner of park to remain.
- Rock fossil walls by staircase to remain.
- Stone wall at north end of park by new ramp to remain.

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

SUBJECT: Begonia Festival Commemorative Public Art Project; Dedication

<u>Recommended Action</u>: Provide final feedback for Begonia Festival Commemorative Public Art Dedication Event

BACKGROUND

In the 1950s, Capitola was recognized as the "World Begonia Capital". The City hosted the wellknown Begonia Festival, which ran from the 1950s through 2017. The last Begonia Festival was held in 2017, due to the closure of local begonia fields. In April 2018, Board Members of the Capitola Begonia Festival contacted the Art and Cultural Commission regarding the proposal of a public art project commemorating the Begonia Festival. The Begonia Festival Board (currently known as the Capitola Beach Festival) voted to donate \$20,000 to the City to be used toward a commemorative public art piece.

In March 2023, staff published a Call to Artists and received eleven (11) submissions. The Art and Cultural Commission appointed a subcommittee to review artist submissions and select three submissions for the Art and Cultural Commission to review and make a final selection. On April 9, 2024, the Commission selected the concept presented by Geoffrey Nelson and on September 26, 2024, the City Council authorized the City Manager to enter into an agreement with Geoffrey Nelson.

DISCUSSION

The current timeline for installation is February 11, 2025. The contributing organizations desire a dedication event to complete the project. The event is scheduled to be held February 22, 2025, from 3ppm to 5pm. The Begonia Public Art Project Committee worked with staff to plan the event.
